

INTRODUCTION

- · There are various types of statues and idols in the museum.
- The museum is built using the architectural styles of various cultures.
- The architecture of the museum from the exterior is inspired by the western style while the dome on the top symbolizes the Islamic culture.
- In the interior of the museum there are 6 major pillars constructed using the himalayan style while the first floor is designed as a Maharashtrian wada.
- This museum is 103 years old.
- There are more than 70,000 objects and artefacts in the museum but only 5 to 10% are on display.
- The Prince of Vales built this museum to showcase culture, heritage and history.
- From 1905 to 1914 the museum was being built.
- During this period World war -1 was on and the museum was being used as a hospital.
- Later in 1922 it was open for the public to visit.
- The architect of this museum was George Wittet (he had also built the Gateway of India).
- · The museum was built using the Indo Saracenic architecture and it is thus so diverse.

STONE TOOLS

We were given an orientation lecture on stone tools and we were also given a chance to touch those tools.

We learnt about various types of stone tools such as:

- Hand axe Used to kill big animals
- Hammer stone Used to shape other stones as well as to kill small animals
- Clibon stone Used to skin the animal and to crush bones and seeds
- Selt Used to cut vegetables





While exploring the natural history section.....

- The museum also has a section dedicated to Mumbai - The city of opportunities.
- They had on display various things used in the past by the mumbaikars such as pata varvanta (used to grind foodstuffs) and shegdi.
- There were replicas of various species of animals from the ancient times some of which are extinct, endangered or vulnerable.
- They had displayed the old map of Mumbai in which it is divided into 7 different islands.
